How to Not Let Your Job Define You

Journalist Simone Stolzoff's book The Good Enough Job helps us envision what a healthier relationship with work would look like. Finding meaning, connection, and identity in our work can be incredibly fulfilling. But somewhere along the way, we have taken this to an extreme. Work has become so all-consuming for many people that we constantly drive ourselves to work harder and longer, feel guilty about not doing enough, and put up with poor working conditions in the name of "passion" or "mission." And if we happen to lose our jobs (or do poorly on an exam), we can completely lose our sense of worth and purpose. How does this relate to your current full-time job as a PharmD student?

Impostor Syndrome is More Common Than You Think

Impostor syndrome, feeling as though you are a fraud even though you are capable and qualified, is more common in the workplace and classroom than previously believed. Research has found that reaching out to family and friends outside the situation can help to reduce feelings of impostorism by helping "students see the big picture and recalibrate their reference groups" and "understand themselves more holistically rather than being so focused on what they felt they lacked in just one area". Leveraging LinkedIn and Networking

IPhO has shared the following information about leveraging LinkedIn and networking. LinkedIn is a social media platform that has many functionalities, particularly in professional development and networking. Recruiters often use LinkedIn to preview and identify an individual's fit for a position. LinkedIn is used heavily by industry

pharmacists in particular! Watch this <u>YouTube video</u> to get some ideas on how to tailor your LinkedIn to an industry audience! General LinkedIn profile tips include:

- Write a strong and engaging headline that captures your skills, expertise, and career aspirations.
- Write a compelling summary that showcases your value proposition to potential employers.
- Remain consistent between your CV and LinkedIn profile.
- Ask individuals to endorse your skills.
- Consistently engage with posts, industry insights, and your connections.
- Use a high-quality, professional headshot for your profile picture.
- Request recommendations from previous coworkers, supervisors, or clients to build credibility.

Once you make an initial connection, whether that be in-person or virtual, you need to consider how to network and jumpstart this connection. The FORM (Family Occupation Recreation Motivation) technique is an effective networking strategy to start small talk and build personal connections. STAR Methods in Job Interviews

Situation

Begin by setting the stage. Describe the context and background of a specific situation you faced. Make it clear and concise, providing enough information for the interviewer to understand the scenario.





Task

Outline the task or challenge you were confronted with in that situation. What were you trying to achieve or solve? This helps to frame the context and your role in the given scenario.

Action

Detail the specific actions you took to address the situation and accomplish the task. Focus on your individual contributions and the steps you personally took. Be explicit about your thought process and decision-making.





Result

Conclude by describing the outcomes or results of your actions. What happened as a result of your efforts?

Emphasize any achievements, improvements, or lessons learned. Quantify the impact if possible, using metrics or percentages.

STAR Method for Interviews

The PLS Professional Affairs committee has shared this graphic about the STAR Method to help you prepare for your next interview. The STAR method stands for Situation, Task, Action, and Result and is meant to help you structure your answer to behavioral interview questions (or any question where you need to tell a story). Using the STAR method helps you provide clear and concise answers.
